

CREST QUIZ

1. The town's coat of arms was officially granted in 1967, and transferred to Rhyl Town Council in 19_3.
2. The basic colour of the shield is known as Tenny, meaning a tawny colour, and refers to the miles of s__d which Rhyl is famous for. The colour is rarely used in arms and this is the first civic arms in the British Isles to be granted with a 'Tenny' colour.
3. The blue and white symbolises the s__ and the harbour at Rhyl on the River Cl__d. The word "Clwyd" means a hurdle or wattle which extends across the shield.
4. The ship and the s ___ on the shield represent the sailing and fishing Industry in Rhyl.
5. The colour ___ represents the Principality of Wales.
6. The green mound represents a 'h__l' where the meaning of the word "Rhyl" comes from. The shield includes the Red Dragon of Wales.



Win and Alan's winter warmer

Cooler months means a return to hearty soups and crusty bread. Here councillors Win Mullen-James and Alan James share their favourite soup recipe.



Ingredients

1 tbsp vegetable oil
15gm butter
1 large onion chopped
3 large parsnips sliced
2 Garlic cloves
1 level tbsp garam masala
1/2 tsp chilli powder
2 large potatoes peeled and diced
850ml vegetable stock
Salt and pepper to taste

Method

Heat oil and butter in a large saucepan
Add onion, parsnips, potatoes and garlic and saute until vegetables are soft but not coloured.
Add spices, stirring well for about 30 seconds
Add stock and simmer until vegetables are soft
Remove some of veg pieces with a slotted spoon and set aside
Liquidise rest of soup before adding remaining vegetables back to pan
Season to taste and simmer gently until piping hot
Serve with crusty bread and ENJOY!

UPDATES & ADVICE

E-scooters: no place on our roads

Many of you have been in touch with us to express your concerns about the e-scooters sometimes seen zipping around town.

We share your concerns and are working with all different parties and groups to clamp down on the illegal activity. If you know someone who has an e-scooter please remind them:

- It is currently impossible to get the appropriate insurance for privately owned e-scooters so illegal to use them on roads or in other public spaces.
- They can be used legally on private land and with the landowner's permission.
- Illegal users risk Fixed Penalty Notices for not having insurance (£300 fine and six penalty points) and for not having a licence (up to £100 fine and between three and six penalty points).
- The police have a range of penalties and fines available to them including seizing an e-scooter if the rider is behaving in an anti-social manner.
- **🚫 Help keep our roads safe: If you see anything that you think breaks the law then let the police know. 📞 101.**

We would like to thank East Ward residents for their patience whilst the new sea defences were being built. Work is now close to completion and will protect 1,200 homes. As you can see, the heavy rock armour is settling down and is lower than the new sea wall so views of the sea can still be enjoyed. The promenade from Splash Point towards Rhyll Golf Club is almost twice the width of the old one too.
